

VERA'S STORYFINDING PURPOSE

"I'm so in love with life, and with God," says Vera. "I honour every moment as sacred." Today Vera lives in Hope Mission's Green Manor. "I love it here; this is my safe place."

Vera is from Hay River, N.W.T. "I grew up in a large Metis family—nine kids. There was love, but there was also alcoholism, abuse and poverty...unfortunately, like many families who endured the residential schools."

"When you grow up—shunned in your communitybeing call a half-breed, or just breed...you come to understand yourself as not quite human. It sets the stage for a bad self-image."

Throughout her formative years and into her first marriage, Vera experienced the horrors of every kind of abuse, all of which she believed were somehow her own fault. Then came the bouts of depression, the drinking, "it was a way out," and the suicide attempts.

In spite of this, and because of Vera's tenacious will and strong work ethic, she survived. "I was the first in my family to graduate high school." Fleeing the abuse, she moved to Grande Prairie. She stayed at a shelter, then found a place, worked and earned a social work diploma. She was employed for a time at a family therapy clinic in Yellowknife. She found purpose, stayed sober for many years.


"It was the loneliness. I went out, and slowly, I began to drink again. It got bad. It was like I was feeding a monster. The withdrawals got worse. I was hospitalized. Then I heard about Wellspring."

"At Wellspring I was able to deal with my rage. I could be angry here, learn to speak for myself."

"And I discovered God's presence...I truly surrendered...the confusion began to drop away. I came to terms with the sexual abuse. Before, I didn't know how to let go. But I finally got it; I began to forgive."

Vera is well into her third year of sobriety. "Now I'm prepared to go any lengths to stay clean. I remember what keeps me alive. God is faithful."

"Here, in my little kitchen, my heart sings...I have so much gratitude."





KIA 5 KM RACE VALUE OF FITNESS

On May 30 at 10 AM, a starting gun will pierce the silence. With months of preparation kids will spring into action. 200 kids will run 5 km to achieve a goal they set in September.

Kids In Action (KIA) shows kids the strength and endurance that come from months of training. Through KIA, Hope Mission offers kids the love of Jesus.

This year, these kids will run in new shoes. Real running shoes that many families cannot afford. Kendall Barber saw the need first hand as she ran last year (every kid runs with a supportive volunteer). She called on River City Runners, her local running group, who launched a 24 Hour Treadmill Challenge. Their goal? Raise \$10,000 to outfit the kids with shoes and support. At the time of this writing, their fundraising has exploded past \$23,000!

"During that time," reflects Tracy, the school principal, " [Hope Mission staff] have worked closely with us to provide summer camp opportunities for children who would otherwise never go to camp." Hope staff have volunteered for field trips, filling the gap for parents working two jobs. Tracy says, "Their unending commitment to service and support has allowed us to offer our students amazing opportunities and help them develop 'big picture' skills and understanding of community and citizenship."

There is also struggle and pain in the Calgary story.

One night, Sean entered the doors for Hope Mission's evening youth program. The team saw cuts on the boy's arms and knew things were not right. Sean told them he had run away from home. Hope Mission was the only place Sean felt safe. The only place he could turn. Sean could be honest and trust our staff.
