I first met Ali at the Hope Mission Café while doing camp registrations. We shared a laugh when I badly mispronounced her last name—and it seemed to give us a connection. Little did I know that I would be Ali's counselor for the coming week.

The moment we got to camp, eight-year-old Ali (not her



real name) and I developed a special bond. I soon noticed, however, that she had a damaging perception of herself. Ali was defensive, often disruptive, and demanding of attention.

I felt frustrated with her, yet I found that these difficult moments were opportunities to draw her aside and ask

her about herself. This was not the response she was used to, and it seemed to deepen our bond and build trust.

I discovered her parents were divorced and that she lived with her mother. Ali had no real relationship with her father, and she told me that her mom said he didn't want her around. This broke my heart.

Now I understood the reason for her feeling rejected and

her troubled behaviour. As a result she had been labeled as a difficult child and was now living up to that label.

I was able to connect with Ali because I understood what it's like not to have a truly healthy connection with your father, and I know the negative feelings that can spring from this.

It was so gratifying to know I had made an impact on little Ali's heart.

As I got to know Ali more, I would give her extra hugs and words of affirmation to encourage her and make her feel special. I found opportunities to tell her how special and beautiful she is. When I think of it now, every moment turned out special—even the difficult ones. And I hope that the moments we shared were planted deep in her heart.

I also cherished the times I was able to pray with Ali. I prayed that God's love would always be with her.

The weekend after the kids had gone back to their homes, I inquired about things at the Hope Mission Café. I was told there was a little girl named Ali who continued to ask about me. It was so gratifying to know I had made an impact on little Ali's heart.

out for these three to share some very special moments together for the third year in a row.

Emma and her brother have no doubt that there is a God who loves them, and that someone here on earth loves them too.
